Gold
was first
discovered here
in 1851. Within
months, the area
was filled with
prospectors seeking
their fortune. The
thriving mining

camps emerged into a boom town known as Table Rock City, which over time became the lovely community that you can still see and experience – Jacksonville.

Gold rush fever brought prosperity very quickly. As the commercial hub for Southern Oregon the town thrived until the railroad bypassed the town in 1884. The boom was over and businesses and residents slowly moved away over the next 50 years.

Now a National Historic Landmark town with over 100 buildings on the National Register of Historic Places, the charming character of this 19th century town and the colorful legends of the past are woven into the fabric of daily life. You will find them reflected in the architecture and historic landmarks that line the streets as well as in the spirit of the people who make this town their home.


